A Reading for the Day

St Mark 7:31-37 (*Jesus heals a deaf man*)

Then Jesus returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis.

They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him.

He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly.

Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, 'He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak.'

L: This is the Gospel of the Risen Christ.

P: Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Some thoughts on the Reading

St Mark 7:37 "He makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

What would it be like never to hear a joke or tell one, never sing a song, tell a friend your trouble, or patiently listen to theirs – or never hear such excellent sermons as *this* one may turn out to be? It would be terrible. And terribly lonely.

Jesus wouldn't let this man's healing be a spectacle for gawking bystanders. He took him aside. Then, with a kindness that's far too rare in modern medicine, he explained the healing he was about to impart. But because the man was deaf, Jesus turned his words into gestures. He put his fingers in the man's ears. He spat and touched the man's tongue. He looked up to heaven, to gather up the divine compassion that was in him all the time. He sighed, knowing this act of healing would expend his compassion and drain his vitality. Then he said a word out loud. St Mark's Gospel reports it in Aramaic, Jesus' native tongue: "Ephphatha, Be open."

That word reached into the deaf man. Taking a trail blazed by God's grace, it entered his listening *spirit*. He'd lived in solitary confinement, imprisoned by deafness. Jesus' word opened the door inside him. "*Open*," he said. "His ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly," says St Mark.

In the early Church, before someone was baptised, the priest would sometimes touch the person's ears and mouth and say that same word, "Ephphatha, be open", just as they were plunged beneath the water, Baptist-style.

Now, if someone threatened to thrust *our* heads under the water, we'd clamp our mouths, grab our noses, and hold our breath. We'd 'close down', in other words, lest we drown. But baptism is Christ's saving work *within* us, so it can't be about closing down. It's about 'opening up'. Salvation relieves our spiritual constipation. It cleanses the clogged passageways of the Spirit and throws open the locked door inside us. This salvation makes us more responsive to reality, not less; more flexible, not more rigid; and more attuned to God, the world, and each other;

We've got our religion wrong if we use it to blind and deafen us. When we look *away* from things because they upset us too much, we're not yet healed. Salvation gives us strength to face them. When we're deaf to someone's apology, we're not yet healed. Salvation gives us strength to forgive. And when we're too mute to say 'I'm

sorry', or to reveal who we really are, we're not yet healed. Salvation loosens our tongues to speak the difficult truths that lie within us, and to purge the lies that lie within us.

Jesus Christ opens a window to our souls that's been painted shut for too long, letting a gust of fresh air flow into their stuffy inner chambers. Dead things are stagnant and stale. But this feels like *life*. The air flows from without to within, and back again. We hear the music of nature again. The breeze brings us the sound of birdsong and the rustling of leaves in the trees. Our spiritual deafness wants this healing.

Israel's primal prayer is also an act of listening. You can find it in the Book of Deuteronomy. "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord. And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your might."

There are two 'commands' there. The second one is 'love' – "Love the Lord your God". But the first one is 'to hear', to listen, to be 'open'. Our souls want to breathe, to hear and speak, don't they? Human breath articulates itself in language and receives it as a meaningful sound – this is the breath of the spiritual life. It's why we place a premium on prayer and music and song. It's the mark of God's very image in us, our ability to hear words and to sing them. Language is God's gift to Adam and Eve. It's at the heart of every human community.

So, if we muffle the cry of the world all around us – whether it's nature's 'silent scream', other people's agony, our own hearts' moaning, or God's Word of judgment upon our sin, or God's Word of infinite mercy (the Word that Jesus turned into a gesture on the cross) – if we're deaf in any of these ways, we show our need for this healing.

And if we're mute, too afraid to speak our inconvenient truth, we show our need for healing too. Or when we drown out someone else's truth with our foolish opinions, we again show our need for healing. (Queen Victoria complained that her Prime Minister, William Gladstone, spoke to her as if she were a public meeting.) Or maybe we talk past each other in duelling monologues because I'm as deaf to *you* as you are to *me*. We both need healing.

When God heals of our spiritual deafness, we begin to hear other voices – the one we call 'conscience' (the guardian of our true selves), and the whispered voice of God, whose voice is so sovereign it can even correct our conscience. We know this voice the moment we hear it. It grips us, even when it hurts, even when we resist. We know we've heard it because it feels like the fresh breeze of reality. "This speaks to me," we say. "I get it. I can really hear now."

What happened? Healing happened. A jammed window was thrust open, and the truth we couldn't hear has breathed the fresh air of reality into our stagnant souls. A door long locked was sprung open, and the truth about we'd dared not speak we now have the courage to say out loud.

This is what happened to the man Jesus healed that day. "He ordered them to tell no one," says St Mark. But how can you tell a man who's just learned to talk *not to talk*? So does the community he can now take part in. "The more Jesus ordered them to tell no one, the more zealously they proclaimed it."

We're not made for loneliness and solitude. We have ears to hear and tongues to tell. We can ask ourselves, "What closed door does Jesus Christ need to open within me? What part of *me* is deaf to *him*?" *Ephphatha*. "Be open, and hear me" says Jesus. "Come alive in the world I came to save."

Prayers of Intercession
