A Reading for the Day

St Luke 24: 36b-48 (*The Risen Jesus allays the disciples' fear and opens their minds to truth.*)

Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought they were seeing a ghost.

He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet.

While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?'

They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.'

Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.'

L: This is the Gospel of the Risen Christ

P: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Some thoughts on the Reading

St Luke 24:41 "They were disbelieving and still wondering."

Jesus' Resurrection is the big pill we're asked to swallow. Is it hallucinogenic, or does it 'open the doors of perception'? If we're aloof but admiring of Jesus, we may feel it's wise to step back from the brink of this mystery, to be safely disbelieving yet still wondering. 'Open' to God? Sure, but not *too* open, lest we fall for something foolish.

So, our answer might be this: "Jesus' *teachings* give one food for thought, that's for sure. He's on par with Socrates, Confucius, and Buddha. Maybe even Oprah. But I'd be a fool to swallow that big pill called Resurrection."

Are we 'brave' to say this, or just timid?

America's third President, Thomas Jefferson, said something like this. He was a brilliant man. But flawed too. The man who penned "All Men are Created Equal" kept slaves and enriched himself on their labour. Yet he was massively in debt when he died. Still, he thought he was much smarter than any first century 'peasant' or present-day 'Christian' – by which he meant he was not as *gullible* as they are.

He took a pair of scissors to the four Gospels – literally. He cut out all the 'superstitious' bits – no angels at Jesus' birth, no temptation story, no healings, no miraculous feedings, no Transfiguration, and certainly no Resurrection. Jefferson was blind to the meaning those 'peasants' saw in these events. They embarrassed him, so he censored them.

Jefferson's 'creed' could be put this way: "Jesus was a man. Jesus died. Jesus is still dead. But we still have some of his 'teachings' in the Scriptures. It's up to you to follow them if you want. And that's that."

The Christian creed, on the other hand, though it's interested in what Jesus said and did, is more interested in who Jesus *is*. It's about following a *Living* Lord.

Jefferson called his censored Bible, *The Life and Morals of Jesus of Nazareth*. Its closing words are these: "There they laid Jesus and rolled a great stone to the door of the sepulchre and departed. *The End.*"

It's a thinner volume than the one he plagiarised from. It makes for a thinner life too. For example, it admonishes you to forgive your enemy. But that's not easy to do, is it? So, you'd better be strong-willed and self-reliant. It's all on *you* now. If you need divine mercy, Jesus is no help to you. He's dead, remember?

This is not Christianity. This is dogmatic moralism, the shrill religion of judgmental secularism. It overestimates human intelligence and underestimates human wickedness. It conveniently requires no Lord.

The sceptic's sticking point – the real 'stumbling block', as St Paul called it – has always been this: that there should be a God who lives a human life, dies a human death, and rises to a new kind of life that no one has words to describe.

Something about this offends us. All of us. Something in us doesn't want this Lord. To trust in his Resurrection would turn us upside down and backwards.

The last time the disciples had seen Jesus, he was dying on a cross. Then his dead body was sealed in a tomb, cut off from the world. At that point, the life these disciples had lived with him died too.

We feel this when people we love die. Our life with them is over. It's entombed in memory now. Memory can re-enact the past, but it can't add anything new. The dead cannot say a fresh "I love you" or "I forgive you." We'll never feel their hand in ours again.

The disciples mourned Jesus' death by enclosing themselves in the upper room, cut off from the world. Fear, grief, and the loss of hope had slammed and bolted that door. Maybe they were angry at Jesus, too, for promising something he didn't deliver. Maybe they were angry at themselves for being so gullible.

That's when Jesus came to them in his *risen* life, and said, "Peace be with you. See my hands and feet. These wounds are emblems of my love. Touch and see."

Just as God opened the tomb and raised Jesus, so Jesus opened the door to that upper room, and then the door to their hearts and minds.

St Luke says, "he opened their minds to *understand the Scriptures*." Why? Why should we need to 'understand the Scriptures'? It's not to take away doubt and wondering. Doubt and wondering are the very forms our faith so often needs to take. How can it not? But the scissors of censorship are never the right tools. We need our eyes *opened* to faith's mystery and meaning.

The Scriptures are the big story of God's whole work in Creation and Salvation. And Jesus' Resurrection applies that big story to our little lives, here and now.

"I will always be in touch with you," he says. "Be my living witnesses, my Church. Let my living truth and peace come alive in *your* life."

The good news is that Jesus' open tomb doesn't just open the doors of perception, it opens onto new life. It resurrects the truth of who we really are, the truth God has placed deep down inside each one of us.

This truth is precious. Our 'real selves' are not forever dead, as we'd feared in our glummest moments. The Gospel touches us when we feel its promise and hear its call to share in his Resurrection. We want this Lord after all.

The bad news is that this can never be just one more 'recreational hallucinogen', a tranquilising, optional 'add-on' to the business of living our lives. The Risen Christ calls us to the brink of mystery, and then beyond. He will turn us upside down and backwards.

It's a big pill, and solid. It can't be nibbled, but only swallowed whole.

Prayers of Intercession

Holy God, you call us to follow in the way of you Risen Son, and to care for each other with words of comfort and deeds of love in the sorrows and trials of life. We lift up our hearts to offer prayers for the Church and the world.

We pray for scientists and researchers, who push back the frontiers of the knowledge of your creation. Sustain them in their work. Teach us to use the knowledge yielded by their efforts in ways that are loving and just.

God of life, open our hearts to your power moving around us, between us, and within us, until your glory is revealed in our love of both friend and enemy, in communities alive with your justice and mercy, and in the healing of all that is broken.

We thank you for those who have died, who loved us well, and for the comforts of memory. Stay with us, Lord, when the day is far spent, and night is at hand.
