The Reading for the Day

St Matthew 10: 24-39 (*There's a hard road ahead. Don't fear it.*)

Jesus said: 'A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household!

'So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground unperceived by your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows.

'Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven.

'Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; and one's foes will be members of one's own household.

Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever does not take up

the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.

Some thoughts on the Reading

St Matthew 10:34 "I have not come to bring peace, but a sword."

I don't like these words. But I must hear them. They remind me that a life of faith is not a game or hobby. Matters of life and death are at stake.

"I have not come to bring peace, but a sword." So much for 'gentle Jesus meek and mild', the harmless rabbi who loves children, speaks softly, and bids us only to say happy things, think good thoughts, and try a bit harder to play well with each other.

If this were all Jesus had lived for, who can fathom what he died for? This 'Mr Rogers of Galilee' doesn't square with the Gospel's vivid witness. It's made from the desires of a society that won't stand for divine criticism. It wants divine affirmation, *only* – a life of comfort built on comfortable lies.

But no. There's so much force in what Jesus says and does. If we let him loose on the way we live, play our politics, and organise our society, we'd either have to change utterly, or we'd have to rise up and kill him all over again. Instead we do neither and play 'let's pretend'.

No wonder the Church is meek and mild, its clergy ineffectual 'nice guys'. But Jesus claims the power to undo our lives as they are right now. Consider his more demanding sayings:

"Those who lose their life for my sake will find it."

"Go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor."

"You cannot serve God and wealth."

"Blessed are you when you're persecuted for doing what's right."

"What does it profit if you gain the whole world but lose your soul?"

"Give to everyone who begs from you."

"Love your enemies."

"Deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow me"

"If your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away."
Which brings us back to this one: "I have not come to bring peace, but a sword."

Yet Jesus struck no one with fist or club or sword. He counselled his disciples "to turn the other cheek". And on the eve of his own death, he said, "all who take the sword shall die by the sword." Jesus launched no jihad, crusade, or holy war. There's something obscene about killing in his name.

So, his sword is not made from steel, is it? It's the sharply spoken *word* that cleaves through falsehoods like a hot knife through cold butter, exposing the lies we live by. Who would want this?

When St Matthew's gospel came to be written, obedience to the claims of faith strained old loyalties. It meant saying not "Caesar is Lord", but "Jesus is Lord." That could earn you a prison term, maybe a death sentence. Is it any wonder a Roman father forbade his children from becoming Christian? It would only bring shame on the family.

So, that's the context for Jesus' other disturbing words: "I have come to set a man against his father, a daughter against her mother...and one's foes will be members of one's own household." Not a happy prospect, is it?

Yet this, too, points to the disruptive truth of Christianity, a truth that (if it's acknowledged, if it's lived) may just give birth to a new freedom, precisely *because* it requires a new obedience, one stretching even the oldest and strongest of bonds to the breaking point. "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me," says Jesus – a line the 'family values' brigade ignores.

Jesus warned his friends and followers. "If they malign me – and they will – how much more will they malign you." And yet, still, "what I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops."

Three times, in short order, he tells them not to fear – not to fear the truth, and not to fear those who'd persecute them for it. For the way of life is to hear the truth and live by it. "I am the way, the truth, and the life," he said. Doesn't *that* make sense?

"So, do not fear," says Jesus. For fear brings out the worst in us. If fear gets hold of us, we may flee the risky business of doing our true work in life. We'll fail at being our *true* selves, our 'soul', and miss the whole point of being who we are. To calm our fear, we'll be a *false* self instead, too afraid to feel and think and speak and live as we ought. In other words, we'll reject Jesus' claim on our lives and fit ourselves to the call of other, lesser claims and people.

"But whoever denies me – and whoever denies their true self, whom I loved and died for – I will also deny before my Father in heaven," he said. "For how will we know it's *you* we're talking about?"

The peace of Jesus Christ we routinely – and naively? – wish for each other is not the bland absence of conflict. It's the disturbing presence of his love and justice, judging us in order to love us, unmaking us so we may be re-made.

In other words, it's 'the peace that passes all understanding', and Jesus gives it to us, not as the world gives, not as false comfort, but as the gift of his love at the cost of his life. And all he asks is that we love him in return, not to deny him but to be 'true' to him; and, in the power of his Spirit, to live as fearlessly and truthfully as he did.

And when we fail? To be forgiven and fail better the next time.
